## Gardening

Dee Guttau went over the presentation she gave at Westfair. She demonstrated some of the tools she uses, including a spade, hoe, and cart.

Dee gave a variety of tips for gardening. She said that raised beds are a good way to start



gardening. It is smaller and easier to control the quality of the dirt. A garden needs at least six hours of sun. Trellises work well for cucumbers and beans. Some plants require acidic soil.

Dee uses Tempo to control bugs. She said lemon grass and citronella plants repel bugs. Now

through September is a good time to put out grub control under trees and bushes that had trouble with Japanese Beetles. Dee uses grass clippings to control weeds.

For onions and potatoes, you need to add dirt around the plants as they grow. There are three kinds of potatoes, short, medium, and long season. Tomatoes come in two categories, determinate and indeterminate. Determinate all ripen at the same time. Cracks in tomatoes result from uneven watering. Sweeter onions keep worse than others.

Dee said she soaks beet seeds for two hours for better germination. She only grows them every three years for making pickled beets.
