



Constitution

The speaker at the Treynor Optimist Club on April 4 was Glenn Freeman. He grew up in Washington D.C. He was in the Air Force, serving three tours in Southeast Asia. He retired after 30 years of service. For twelve years he served as a senior aide to U.S. Senator Chuck Hagel as Special Assistant for Military and Veterans Affairs.

Glenn gave a little history lesson on the forming of the Constitution. He wanted us to remember that a few people can make a great change. One of the basic Principles of the Constitution is that all three branches of the government would be equal. For that reason Glenn believes all branches of the government should have term limits if one does.

Glenn believes it is unconstitutional to make citizens report their personal financial information to be taxed, as it is unconstitutional to be compelled in any criminal case to witness against himself. Glenn is aware of several things that need to change but there is no action in process to make those changes.
