One of the highlights was the opportunity to observe the President Regan funeral processional.

TORT REFORM?

Attorney Tony Tauke has been practicing civil and real estate law for over twenty-five years. He noted several court cases of civil suits in recent years where the large jury awards received a great deal of publicity. He said there seems to be a growing sentiment to limit the amount

of damages the jury can declare against the defendant. McDonalds spilled coffee case is one example where the plaintiff was awarded \$2.9 million for seemingly doing a foolish thing. However, Tony noted that there were already 700 burn cases attributed to extra hot coffee before this incident and the coffee supplier had asked that the serving temperature be lowered. Tony explained that when all the facts of what happened, how it happened, and who was responsible are presented to a jury, reasonable awards usually result. Furthermore the judge filters the jury decisions to keep the court system in balance. From his experience and observations of the court Tony does not think the movement toward tort reform is warranted.

BE A PARTY STOPPER

County Supervisor and Council Bluffs Policeman Loren Knauss spoke to Club members about the current efforts to prevent underage drinking and the tragic results of traffic deaths. Loren discussed the Party Stoppers program in effect throughout the There is a hotline phone number (712-328-7867) to report parties where underage alcohol drinking is happening. Loren noted that 15 calls were received last year. There is a \$50 reward when law enforcement breaks up a party, but only one caller asked for it last year. Small parties often grow into large parties that grow into even larger parties as youth can communicate so easily by cell phones as to what is happening. Responsibility and common sense are checked at the door. Police scanners often warn youth of impending raids. Loren stated that the prime party times are near the end and beginning of the school year. Too many parents allow underage drinking and their homes become know as the party houses. recalled that there were two traffic-related deaths in the county last year attributed to underage drinking. Two sets of parents lost a child due to irresponsible party drinking. We all can be party stoppers to prevent this tragedy of youth. Loren stated that funds are being solicited for radio and newspaper announcements to discourage youth drinking parties.
