HEAD BASKETBALL COACH STARTING 1ST **SEASON**

Treynor Head Basket Ball Coach Scott Rucker is new to the job this season, but he has had experience coaching small college teams before coming to Treynor three years ago. Rucker is also a teacher of science, biology, and physics to Treynor students. Teaching, Rucker noted, is his passion and coaching is his joy. He recently started youth activities in November and December to teach young players basket ball skills and give them some experience on the court. Cardinal Hoopla group was formed for K to 3rd graders. Also a 4th - 6th grade basketball clinic was organized. Rucker is assisted in his coaching by Travis Castle, Todd Gordon, and Andrew Hopp. Rucker noted the coaching staff demonstrates teamwork as an example to the varsity and junior varsity players. Rucker stated there are 28 players in the $9^{th}-12^{th}$ grade group and the varsity team is relatively young. Playing in 2-A competition in the Western Iowa Conference, the team will be challenging this season. To Rucker the basketball experience is an extension of learning for the players. He emphasizes to the players that they personify their community in their conduct on the basket ball court, and he is proud of their determination and effort.
