

DEFEATING THE BULLY SYSTEM

Steve Owens joined the Optimist Club to speak about what the Treynor Schools are doing to stop bullying. There is a new state program in lowa that every school in the state has to have a program next year to stop bullying. Treynor started their program this past year.

Treynor is using the Olweus [pronounced OI-VEYus] Bullying Prevention Program, a research based program. It is a comprehensive, school-wide program designed for use in elementary, middle, or junior high

schools. Its goals are to reduce and prevent bullying problems among school children and to improve peer relations at school.

Bullying is when a person is exposed over a period of time to one or more negative actions on the part of one or more students. The key components of the program school components, classroom components, individual components, and community components.

Training has involved everyone in the school, including teachers, bus drivers, janitors, and volunteers. focus is on grades 3-8, but all grades from kindergarten through 12th grade included. The key to the program is prevention and awareness.

Bullying often involves an imbalance in power or strength. Bullying includes direct bullying and indirect bullying, both of which are addressed in the program. Direct bullying includes threats, force, and negative Indirect bullying includes things like spreading rumors, deliberate exclusion from a group, and cyber-bullying.

GROWING FLOWERS AND TREES

Craig Canoyer from Canoyer Country Greenhouse was the guest speaker on 7 June. They now have 60,000 square feet of greenhouses in three locations, covering about 1.5 acres.

They don't grow anything from seed, because seeds don't have the quality of cuttings because they can cross pollinate. They produce 30,000 cuttings for geraniums and about 250,000 plants each year. They have 26 varieties of geraniums and 250 different annuals.

Craig said that they use cuttings to start trees. It takes one year to root a tree cutting in a sand bed with a mist on a timer. They start about 300 trees each year.

Rose cuttings are only half as hardy as root division for new roses. They use root division.

The nursery sells 10,000 hanging baskets each year. All plants they sell are patented, so they pay a royalty for each plant cutting they create.

In trees, the Austin Blaze Maple is their most popular tree now. Bayer is expected to produce a chemical next year that will kill the Ash Tree borer next year, but no one is buying Ash trees now.
