

Treynor Track Teams

Gail Hartigan spoke at the Treynor Optimist Club on April 21. This year track is organized more like a college sport. Different coaches are over different areas for boys and girls. Mr. Owens is taking the sprinters for High School boys and girls. Mrs. Hartigan is working with the middle distance runners. Mr. Schleisman is working with the distance runners. Others are working with long jumpers, throwers, high jumpers, and hurdles. Mrs. Hartigan organizes the track meets. She said that the staff really likes this arrangement and there is less complaining among the youth.

Conner Meis and Chaley Rath are going to the Drake Relays this year and should do well. In other track interests, Griswold freshman Rebekah Topham is a big favorite in the 300 meter.

This year there are 38 girls and about 30 boys out for High School track. There are about 40 girls and 40 boys out for Jr. High track.

Girls basketball was a struggle this year. The girls did what they were asked to do, but lack of instinct through experience hurt them.

Gail talked about her children, Blaine, Leigh, and Kyle. Blaine has been working for Target in Council Bluffs for the past 11/2 years. Leigh graduated with a Masters in Sports Management. She is a volunteer coach at Simpson and wants to teach college sports. Kyle is in his Junior year in Sports Management.

Iowa Architectural Foundation Community Design Program

Tom Lewis talked about the Community Design Program on April 28. The focus of the design is on Highway 92 between the welcome signs on each end of town. His slide show focused on weaknesses, strengths, suggestions, and phase one of the project for Treynor.

Weaknesses in Treynor include having no town center, speed of traffic on Highway 92, lack of pedestrian benches and waste receptacles, Highway lighting inconsistencies, inconsistent sidewalks, and lack of bicycle accommodations.

Strengths include the Community Center, new town entrance signs, grocery store, and the highway connected to Council Bluffs. Treynor has a pocket park next to the bank, a Post Office, Veteran's Memorial, a desirable school system and a high level of community involvement. The town also has the TRA, a new housing development for future growth, and has been successful in past projects.

The Community Design Program suggested directional signage in town, updated street lighting, and dedicated pedestrian crossings. Consistent landscaping, such as bumpins with trees, would add to the town's appearance and slow Highway traffic. Dedicated seating and bicycle racks would add to the town appeal. They also recommended a community logo, a common business web presence, consistent building façade treatment, and including Treynor on future bicycle trails.

Phase one of the project will most likely include pushing for crosswalks, directional signage, a sign North of Treynor, trees for landscaping around the Veteran's Memorial, and a consistent town logo and identity for stationary and signs.
