Mick Guttau and Ryan Avis - Church Security Information

Mick Guttau, assisted by Ryan Avis, both from Treynor, spoke on Saturday, December 2 at the Treynor Optimist Club meeting. They shared information about church security from the Sheepdog Seminar they attended at Brookside Church in Omaha. The seminar was designed for church, school, and community leaders interested in learning to maximize protecting people. The name "Sheepdog" comes from a dog as a pup growing up with a flock of sheep. The Sheepdog thinks differently and protects the sheep from the wolves, the crazy ones.



The featured speaker at the Seminar was Col. Dave Grossman, an American author who has specialized in the study of the psychology of killing. Three other speakers also taught.

Guttau and Avis shared the following principles they learned at the Seminar:

"Our enemy is denial". "We want to believe that 'Faith protects us from harm." However, evil is part of life as was true for Job in the Bible. Every state has had a type of church crime. Church crime doesn't just happen on Sun. morning. Recent crimes in churches are causing people to ask to be protected. It was mentioned that there is an annual seminar for women in churches to learn protective measures.

"When a killer develops a process, his fear is not death, but failure." To the attacker a church

building is no more sacred than a nightclub, and possibly is more of a target. The crime triangle involves desire, ability and opportunity. Organizations can control opportunity.

Grossman's book, <u>Assassination Generation</u>, discusses the importance of downsizing time kids play video games. It was also suggested that there be no blue screens in the bedroom. Kids need to shut off their brain to sleep.

Establish standing operating procedures (SOPs) for security. Training is the # 1 principle. Team members can take turns doing security. Build a security team with your organization members using a team leader, medical response team, technical team, and protective team. Consider locking doors and monitoring entryway. One immediate action step for schools and churches could be to consider plastic bullet proof film over glass which stops/slows down penetration.

Questions that arose at the Optimist Club meeting were about insurance, sharing with church attendees, is hiring a police officer advised, when is a church too paranoid, considering legal aspects which requires training, and more.
