Christy Baker, TS Bank, speaks about Fraud to Treynor Optimists

Christy Baker spoke about fraud and fraud prevention to the Treynor Optimist Club on Saturday, May 26. She has worked at TS Bank for ten years. As Chief Credit Officer her responsibility is for the products and services at TS Bank. She and her husband, Eric, have two sons and live on an acreage near Oakland.

Baker stated that the advantage of debit cards is you don't have to carry cash. We all are aware that merchants and card processors, such as the Target and Home Depot scams, have vulnerabilities. If this happens to you, call the bank and you will be given the next steps and presented options. Generally the old debit card number is shut down and a new card is issued and can be done so with Instant Issue. Consumers have zero liability when their card is compromised and the bank eats 99% of the loss. Consider that \$1400 is the most that could be taken out in a day.

TS Bank invests in Falcon Fraud, a Shazam anomaly detection software, which reduces the cost of losses to the bank. If a transaction is determined to be abnormal. Shazam shuts the card down or calls the client to verify. If you know you are going to be out of the Midwest, you can call the number on the back of the card to

report you will be using your card out of state or country.

Checks contain all your personal information and bank account information and if compromised, there is no dollar limit of what could be taken out. If a check is forged, it is a larger crime and you are first directed to contact the police first. With a debit card, the fix is quick.

Shazambolt\$ is a product that allows you to choose debit card alerts you'd like to be notified by text or email about, such as if there is a transaction over \$50 of if there is an international purchase and more. You can also choose to block the above transactions so they never happen. You are also given the ability to turn the use of your card on or off, if you lose your card.

If you are traveling overseas, you will need a chip in your card with MasterCard or Visa. debit card numbers are issued to joint account clients so that if one card is compromised, the other is not. Baker recommended having more than one method of payment.

Ways to help with fraud prevention is to monitor your account activity, check for skimmers on ATMs or gas pumps (don't use if the card insert holder is crooked or can be gently wiggled) and look for an unbroken seal tape (on the left side usually) of gas pumps.
