Dr. Corey Vorthmann speaks about TradeWorks Academy

Dr. Corey Vorthmann, Treynor, Chief Academic Officer with CB Community School District, spoke on Saturday, November 3 to the Treynor Optimist Club about the Trade Works Academy.

The TradeWorks Academy will "provide more opportunities and more choices because trades work". With more than half of skilled trades workers over the age of 45, the shortage of workers continues to grow. At this time for every five positions that are available in industry, only one person has the skills to qualify.

In the past there was an emphasis on students attending a four year college or they wouldn't make it, he said. This is appropriate for many, but not all. There is an incredible demand for skilled job workers. In all industries that need skilled workers 68% do not require a Bachelors' degree. An example is Google. The perception is that Google's greatest worker needs is as computer operators, but in actuality the two main core job positions at Google are in HVAC and Electrical Maintenance. 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The Academy is being built at Abraham Lincoln and Thomas Jefferson High Schools, but Dr. Vorthmann emphasized that it is open to any high school student in the area who wants to attend. They would need to provide their own transportation. They would also return to their own school for regular classes. TradeWorks Academy offers five areas of study, including: Mechanics, Construction, Fabrication, Electrical, and Plumbing and HVAC/Refrigeration.

The Academy is aimed at Freshmen and Sophomores in high school to begin. Students can continue their Junior and Senior year to take classes in the trades in partnership with Iowa Western Community College which will allow them to graduate with a high school diploma and a certificate.

The opportunities in the trades give the students upon graduation a 90% employment rate and they can earn immediately \$30,000 up to \$50,000 in certain trades with their first job. This is also an opportunity to not have any student debt! The two high schools can handle a total of 300 students in the Trades Work Academy.

Vorthmann indicated information has been sent to schools and presentations will soon be made to superintendents at group meetings to get the word out to schools.
