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Dan Nielsen Speaks to the Optimists

Dan Nielsen, Treynor, spoke to the Treynor Optimist Club on August 24, 2019. After a career of mechanics, Nascar and seven years of owning an auto repair shop in Treynor, he decided to make a major change and now owns Genuine Pest Control.



A friend in Pittsburg encouraged him to check out the pest control business, which Dan at first declined because it was "disgusting". However, his friend encouraged him to ride with him for two days. He decided it wasn't really too bad. Dan ended up buying a truck and equipment from him. His friend has been his mentor.

Dan now has three employees working for him – one in the office, one with pest control, and one with wildlife control. Anything that is a pest or wildlife he will deal with

Dan shared story after story of what all he has seen varying from a possum in the basement of a \$2 million home in Omaha (grandkids left the basement door open) to wasp nests that are beach ball size in attics to having 120 bat jobs in a year plus more.

Dan stated that many roofs are not finished correctly causing major problems. Chimneys that are open can also cause problems. The maternity season for bats is June 1 to Aug. 15. Bats are caught, frequently using a one-way valve system and then released outside. In the spring he receives many raccoon calls, averaging 10-15 raccoons a week. He can use a thermos imaging gun to determine what is in a wall.

In Iowa and Nebraska wild animals must be released within 100 yards or can be euthanized. Dan stated that most animals will die quickly when exposed to the wild. The alternative is they come right back.

Raccoons have minds like a puzzle. Film footage has shown that they can learn every part of a trap to avoid, they can unscrew lids, can unhook cages, and can pull off soffits.

Nielsen is not fond of wild bird feeders as they feed a lot of mice, rats, squirrels, and raccoons. This can create problems in urban neighborhoods.

Dan also stated that home remedies do not work. Windex will kill any bug including ants and even Japanese beetles. A mixture of Seven dust and water is good for large areas for the beetles.

Bed bugs can be treated with a special spray that is harmless to people and animals. If you are concerned about termites, he can place stations to check every few weeks to see if treatment is needed.

Dan stated he really likes his job because the cost of materials is low and people are very happy when he comes.
