Supt. Dr. Hopkins Speaks

Dr. Mark Hopkins, new Treynor School Superintendent, spoke to the Treynor Optimists on Saturday, December 14 at the Treynor Community Building. Supt. Hopkins was raised as a farm kid in Lorenz, Iowa and pursued speech, drama, agriculture activities. He and his wife Debra have three grown boys.



Hopkins first job was at Farragut teaching English/Language and coaching speech and drama for seven years. He then taught two years at Dennison, became a principal at Lone Tree, did advanced work at the University of Iowa and then became AHST Superintendent for three years. He has now completed his PHD while also working at Buena Vista College of Education and

is now in his first year at Treynor. He and his wife are currently living in Council Bluffs but are building a house in Treynor.

Supt. Hopkins was excited to share the good news that became public this week about the bequest of \$5 million from the estate of Rick Wenninghoff to be used for scholarships for Treynor and Underwood students. The details are in the planning stage still. Dr. Hopkins stated this is huge for the school and very much appreciated.

TeamMates was the second topic discussed. An advisory group is implementing the program through the school first with 3rd and 6th grade students. There is a need for mentors to commit to meeting with a child during school time for an hour once a week. The mission of TeamMates, founded by Tom and Nancy Osborne in 1991, is to provide support and encouragement to school aged youth. The time can be spent talking, playing a board game, helping with school work, etc.

The third main topic was an update about the construction project at the school. The bus garage project should be completed by mid-January. This project provides safer drop off and pick up of elementary students. One bus barn is unheated and

will hold up to eight buses plus vans and cars. There are electrical outlets for warming up buses. The heated bus barn includes a break room, office, and area to maintain buses.

Due to heavy rains last summer, the projected date for completion of the new school building construction is now Feb. 2021. Steel beams are currently going up for the roof. This new portion will be totally enclosed by Feb.

The big benefits of the building project are a 500 seat auditorium, a larger band and vocal room, a larger weight room, a larger wrestling room HVAC in the gym area, four more class rooms plus more offices, new locker rooms plus more.

Other topics discussed were seat belts required in new buses, the mascot agreement, American history, and the various hats he is wearing. Welcome to Treynor, Supt. Hopkins!

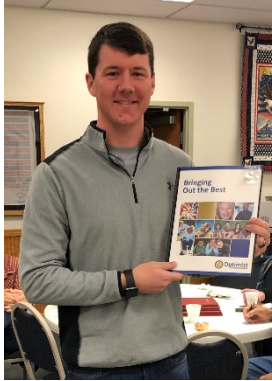
