Starlyn Perdue from IWCC speaks

Starlyn Perdue spoke today about her job at Iowa Western Community College helping companies with their workforce training.



Starlyn graduated from Riverside in 2000 and received a Presidential Scholarship to attend IWCC where she received her Associates Degree and then transferred to Bellevue

University and received her BS in Sociology. She then sought employment at IWCC where she has worked for 15 years. Her first two years were in Continuing Education, developing programs to help people to become better in their careers. She then transferred to the Economic Development Department.

Iowa Western applies to have funds through Debbie Durham, Director of the Iowa Economic Development Authority, and this is then infiltrated into the seven county region. IWCC helps companies with workforce training. Some businesses she works with are Conductix in Harlan, which produces rail and wire systems used at Disney, Plastic Professionals in Atlantic, which produces the large plastic feet used in Disney characters as well as Yeti coolers, Tommy Gates in Woodbine, which produces hydraulic liftgates, Pella Windows in Shenandoah. IWCC then puts together a training plan. The state provides funds to offset that cost and the companies train the employees to help keep them there and in the local community.

IWCC can help with new jobs programs through their 260E program. A company can add new positions and can raise training funds through a bond sale which is paid for by their state

withholding tax. It will pay for 100% of the training costs. It is a win-win because it is using the company's taxes for training. Small shops or larger companies can utilize this service.

Starlyn spoke about other work force educational opportunities at IWCC: TradeWorks (Gary Funkhouser indicated three Treynor students are enrolled next year.) The SEAM program at the Clarinda hub. She indicated the new Dr. Dan Kinney (son of the former President) has a passion for the hub campuses: Harlan, Atlantic, Shenandoah, and Clarinda. Clarinda was the original started in 1966. The CB campus was started in 1967. She is serving on a task force for further development of the hub campuses.

Other topics discussed were: Land use on the CB campus, sports, credit transfers to universities and enrollment trends.

Travis Castle, Vision Treynor, will speak next Saturday.

Old/New Business:


