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Chris McQueen, Bike Enthusiast, Speaks



Chris answered the first question he is normally asked: Is he related to Steve McQueen? He is not. His ancestors came from Scotland. As a bicyclist, he has never been on Ragbrai. He has lived in Iowa for four years and will probably go on that ride someday, if he can find the right group of people to ride with.

Chris grew up in Utah, started bicycling in 1994, and rode in the desert and on fire roads there. His wife has competed in several wheelchair bicycling races. She won several races and came in 6th in the Boston Marathon for her class.

He does stop at Stop signs when riding. In Idaho and Colorado, a Stop sign legally is the same as a Yield sign for bicycles.

Cyclocross is a form of bicycle racing. Races typically take place in the autumn and winter, and consist of many laps of a short course featuring pavement, wooded trails, grass, steep hills and obstacles requiring the rider to quickly dismount, carry the bike while navigating the obstruction and remount. Cyclocross is very popular in Europe and a very competitive sport with very stringent rules. Bicycles have wider tires than road bikes.

Gravel racing uses smaller tires than cyclocross, but are wider than most bikes, and is all about having fun with no rules. Chris started the Iowa Gravel Series, publishing the first race in March 2020 for a September race. He didn't want more than 100 participants and 95 showed up. This year Chris organized five races, one per month on a Saturday, with each race 100 kilometers or 62 miles. The first one was the

Silver City Century on May 8 with 125 participants; the second was the Waukon 100 with 50 participants. The others are Albia Rock Road, Preparation Pisgah, and Glenwood Gravel Grinder.

The races are self-supporting with a \$50 registration fee. They run from 7:00 am- 1:00 pm, with a couple of stops along the way. Participants get a T shirt and a meal at the end. Riders sign a liability waiver. Chris also has a \$1M liability policy. He gives out flyers to houses along the path so they know about the race and keep their dogs away from the riders. 10%-15% of the participants are competing for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place prizes in the men and women divisions. Others are just riding for fun. His youngest rider was 12 and the oldest was about 90. Chris said his 15 year old son takes pictures along the way.

A good gravel road bike will cost \$500-\$5000, with most in the \$1000-\$1500 range. They range from a 10 speed to a 24 speed. More information is available at IowaGravelSeries.com
