

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Gene Seran Speaks About Turkey



Gene Seran, one of our Optimist members, spoke about his life coming from Turkey in 1958 at the age of 17. He worked at the Turkish American Air Force Affiliation in the Base Exchange Building in Ankara which supplied materials to power the US

Army, Navy, and Air Force.

There he met and became good friends with Ev Johnson from Omaha, who sold insurance for building airplanes during WW II. Gene was able to get Turkish law info to Ev Johnson which Ev then gave to the Air Force and the AF won the contract from Turkey.

The AF rewarded Gene by sending him to the US. Ev Johnson helped him settle in Omaha. His parents said, "If you have wings, go."

In Turkey Gene could no longer get an education. In America he attended Creighton University, got his Masters, and a Specialist Degree too. He became a teacher and counselor at Ralston for 28 years. He shared that he attended schools in Turkey without his parents even knowing just to exchange ideas.

In 1991 Gene quit teaching to do real estate. Losing a child was a deciding factor to not need anyone's help anymore and do whatever it takes to care for his family. He believes teachers should be paid more and education is very important. He said America is the only country where you can start with nothing, accumulate wealth, but education is more valuable than wealth. He enjoyed teaching and coaching every day.

If Gene had stayed in Turkey, there is a caste system. Unless you know somebody, you can't advance. The Turkish custom is bad – you have to bribe to get what you want. Gene refused to ever take a bribe. He stated the contrast here in America is you are treated so well. But in

America we have 48" of snow and you have to dig yourself out to get from the house to school!

After leaving education, Gene acquired rental houses which are still a headache today. He helped Rod Miller get a furnace working and was told about a farm on Applewood Rd, which they lived on for a number of years. Through Rod and working together with Bob Hibbard he became acquainted with Treynor and owns real estate on Main Street. He considers Treynor his home town.

We enjoyed his story about Mrs. Joe, who owned the Treynor Hardware Store. Gene and one of her sons owned a gas station. The son would buy outdated cigarettes. Gene would give them to Mrs. Joe, who smoked them all. She asked him if he would like to buy the local hardware store. He did.

Gene shared his thoughts on immigrants. He said there is nothing wrong with being an immigrant and becoming a citizen to then have rights, earned, but not given to them. He feels immigrants must contribute to this country. Today instead they start living just like everybody else.
