Bryce Strohbehn was the speaker at the Treynor Optimist Club on February 15. He works at the Nebraska Medical Center on the patient information system and volunteers at the Treynor Fire Department.

Bryce and his wife Kim have been married 30 years. They have three children. At one time Bryce had four motorcycles. He had sold two, then sold one to buy an engagement ring for his wife and another to buy diapers for babies. Sixteen years later he bought another motorcycle. Now he and his wife both have 1800 cc Harleys.

Bryce and his wife have been to 34 states on their motorcycles. His goal is to go to all of the 48 lower states and Canada.

Seven years ago Bryce joined the Christian Motorcyclist Association (CMA), a non-profit, non-denominational organization totally supported by motorcyclists and

enthusiasts who believe in Jesus Christ, believe in this ministry, and give sacrificial gifts of love. The objective of the organization is to help people. For the past 26 years, CMA has raised funds to extend Christian outreach ministries to people throughout the world.

CMA has one large fundraiser each year, called "Run for the Son". In 26 years they have raised over \$48 million to help spread the Good News. 20% of the funds they raise goes to The JESUS Film Project, 20% to Open Doors, 20% to Missionary Ventures, and 40% to their outreach ministry.

The JESUS Film Project, a ministry of Campus Crusade for Christ, equips JESUS film teams in 49 countries and translations into new languages. They also use projectors with solar charged batteries for remote areas with no electricity.

Open Doors supplies Bibles and Christian literature and training in the world's most oppressive and restrictive countries.

Missionary Ventures gives motorcycles and other transportation to indigenous pastors and evangelists. They have given over 4779 motorcycles, 6296 bicycles, 23 horses, 24 boats, one camel, and one horse and buggy to pastors working in 90 different countries. The motorcycles are typically small 125 to 150 cc and the pastors are also provided with money for gas.

On Saturday, May 3, 2014, motorcyclists from all over the United States and Canada will participate in the annual Run for the Son. Everyone gets together at noon to pray. More information is available at cmausa.org.
